

## Bill Fields Wins Top Honor

Bill Fields, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Gilster, was a top winner in the orth Dakota State Science and Engineering Fair held recently in Dickinson.

He is one of two students who will receive all-expense paid trips to the International Science and Engineering Fair in San Diego May 5.

In the state contest he received the unior Engineering Technical Society ward as one of two best engineering students. This is the award which sends Bill and his Isometric Protractor to the International Fair.

In the Northeast District fair he won first in the Senior Division and the U. S. Air Force award for best engineering project and the U. S. Army award for the best engineering project. In the Cavalier Science Fair

he won second in the Senior Physiological Division.

Bill is a senior who came to Cavalier from East Syracuse High School and is considering a career as an Air Force pilot. His other interests include band, DeMolay, and a Kawasaki motorcycle.

Karon Eastburn's NIM computer was awarded a plaque for the best mathematics project in the North Dakota State Science and Engineering Fair and was named first alternate from her district.

In the Northeast Science Fair she was named Most Outstanding Student in the Field of Electronics, an honor which carries with it a medal donated by the U. S. Air Force. Karon swept the group of awards sponsored by the U. S. Army with a trophy for overall winner of the Senior Science Division.

a medal and tie tack for the best project in science and engineering, a slide rule for the most outstanding entry in the engineering field, a portfolio for being most outstanding in the district, and a certificate of achievement as most outstanding student. In the Cavalier Science Fair she won first in the Senior Physiological Division.

Karon, who plans a career in mathematics and science, began her interest in computers as a member of the Explorer Scout Troop sponsored by Bell Telephone Laboratories in Whippany. She is a straight-A junior, and attended Parsippany Hills High School for two years.

Also participating in the local and district contests were Katherine Martinez, Todd Boyd, and Lorri Genack.

### March, 1973, Warmest Ever On Record

Even though individuals who are new to this area probably consider North Dakota temperatures rather chilly, any long-time resident will confirm that this winter has been about the warmest on record for quite some time.

The Langdon Agricultural Experiment Station keeps records for the National Weather Service, and they report that the area has received less than half the normal snowfall to date. The average snowfall is 35.2 inches, and this year only 16.8 inches was recorded. Langdon's records date back to 1896, with March, 1973, being the warmest March ever recorded in Langdon. Normal March snowfall is 7.5 inches; March, 1973, only saw 1.1 inches. Average monthly temperature,

The Club welcomes new memberships and provides a great opportunity for making new friends, as it is ctively supported by the majority of area residents.

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
Wedding bells will ring in August for Martha Wooten and Major G. E. Keneipp. Martha is secretary to W. R. Blankenship. Congratulations!
