Safeguard Support Pervices Project Launched

On April 11, 1972, Messrs. Tom King and Bob Endsley arrived in rather chilly Grand Forks, North Dakota, for their first time, to set about the task of organizing Pan Am's Safeguard Support Services Project.

Upon arriving in Langdon, one of their initial duties was to locate a central administrative office. This was accomplished when the City Park Building was made available for rent. To ready the building for occupancy, the staff members pitched in and moved the many picnic tables that were packed into the building to another location, swept the floors, moved a piano, and dismantled and moved a bandstand. Some of the windows, as well as the rest room doors of the former Youth Center had he cartoon characters from the comic strip "Peanuts" painted on them, and these objects d'art were scraped off and removed.

Following the basic clean-up of the interior, work was begun on a modern photographic laboratory that would occupy one-half of the structure. Pespite the hammering of carpenters, and the ear-splitting strains of rip saws that were heard during this construction, work continued to progress on staffing not only clerical positions on site, but administrative and clerical openings within Pan Am's organization.

In August of 1972, additional work

was given to Pan Am in a variety of areas that would eventually triple the number of employees on the project. Cecil C. Carter, Project Manager, and D. W. Welch, Administrative Manager, arrived in Langdon. Soon the office was rearranged, carpeted, and partitions were added. From the end of October until January, the hiring of new employees to fill the many positions in the BOS contract kept the Personnel Department very active.

As the on-site work has taken on more broad and definite shape, and the more than 480 employees of Pan Am are actively engaged in the business of providing a multitude of essential services, it is amusing to recall those meager days of a year ago when the picnic tables were the main occupants of the Park Building.

There's Action On Softball And Baseball Fields



Motocross Race Held In Pembina Hills

The River Bend Riders Motorcycle Club, comprised largely of WSC and dependent personnel, held their first otocross race of the season Sunday, May 27, in the Pembina Hills west of Concrete, North Dakota. Motocross is considered by many to be the most physically demanding sport in the world.

The event was a complete success; spectators enjoyed the balmy spring veather from their grassy hillside erches, from which 90 per cent of the rough, demanding 3/4 mile course was visible.

Race director Rick Hayden ran off the afternoon's 12 heat races, or 'motos', without a hitch. Although spills and crashes occurred, rider injuries were confined to a few scrapes and bruises, with an occasional bent ego thrown in.

Congratulations are in order for Mrs. Betty Heischmann, who is the president-elect of the Cavalier Mrs. Jaycees chapter.


